# THIRTY-SEVENTH REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

## Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum

AND LYING-IN HOSPITAL,

FOR YEAR ENDING 30th JUNE, 1894.

*To the Governors and Subscribers.*

In submitting our Annual Report, and before entering into details, we feel it incumbent upon us to express our gratitude to the subscribers and the public for their generous support during the year just closed, enabling us to maintain the prestige of our Benevolent Asylum—admitted on all hands to be a model Institution of the kind in the Australasian Colonies.

First and foremost stands that noble effort, crowned by unprecedented success, which will ever be regarded as forming an epoch in the history of this noble Institution; we allude to the Shilling Coupon movement conceived by our respected fellow-townsmen, Mr. J. W. Rail, J.P., perfected by his talented and energetic coadjutors, the Rev. Curzon-Siggers and Mr R. Maddern, with the co-operation of a number of benevolent ladies, and liberally responded to by a generous public; the movement happily styled "Special Winter Relief Fund," resulting in the handsome sum of £691 already received, and a further sum yet to come in. It has been a grand and NOBLE EFFORT, and our cordial thanks are accordingly due to all concerned.

The daily average number of inmates for the year was 310½, being 2½ more than that of the preceding year. The number of inmates in the Asylum on the 30th June, 1893, was 238 males and 78 females; total, 316. Admitted during the year, 105 males and 92 females; total 197; total of all, 513. Of these, 50 males and 89 females discharged, 49 males and 6 females died, leaving in the Asylum at the end of the year 244 males and 75 females; total, 319, being an increase, as compared with the former year, of 6 males, and a decrease of 3 females; total, 3. The average cost of maintenance per head has been £15 ls 2¼, as against £18 9s. 0½d for the year ending 30th June, 1893.

During the year the mortality has been greater than the previous one, a number of inmates, who had attained a ripe old age, having succumbed from natural decay.

#### LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

The number of cases admitted during the year was 40; 11 adults and 4 infants remaining from the previous year; total, 51 adults and 4 children. 43 children were born (2 being stillborn), viz., 22 males and 21 females; 48 adults and 44 infants were discharged and 2 died, leaving in the Institution 3 adults and 1 infant on the 30th June, 1894. The average stay in the Asylum per patient was 31·88 days, against 43·33 the previous year. Great praise is due to the nurse, Mrs. Sheldrick, for her zeal and attention to the delicate duties appertaining to the office of this department.

#### OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The amount expended in out-door relief was £2347 7s. 9d, showing a decrease of £8 12s. 9d. as compared with the preceding year. The average number of recipients per week for the year ending 30th June, 1893, was 411·25 adults and 245·28 children; total, 656·53; and for the year ending 30th June, 1894, 481·82 adults and 235·85 children; total, 717·67, being an increase of 70·57 adults, and a decrease of 9·43 children. The average cost per head per annum for adult and child was £3 5s. 5d.; and per week, 1s. 3½d., against £3 11s. 9½d. and 1s. 4½d. respectively the previous year. The number of persons actually receiving relief, both inmates and out-door recipients on the 30th June, 1894, being 1161, or 156 more persons than at the close of the year ending 30th June, 1893.

#### FINANCIAL.

Statement of receipts and expenditure from the 1st July, 1893, to the 30th June, 1894, has been duly audited and found correct.



The intimation from the Under-Treasurer last year, that we should probably have to submit to a further reduction in the Government grant-in-aid, has been more than confirmed, the Subsidy being actually reduced by a further sum of £900, thus curtailing our revenue from that source by no less than £1400 in two years, necessitating your Committee to infringe on the reserve fund to the extent of £774 3s. 4d., to pay off a bank overdraft, this amount being considered a liability due to the reserve or endowment fund as shown in the Balance-sheet.

You will note in the Balance-sheet a Cr. balance of £669 18s. 6d., which, however, is more apparent than real, inasmuch as the sum of £774 3s. 4d., temporarily withdrawn from the endowment fund to tide over a financial difficulty (the wiping off a bank overdraft) will, together with deposits amounting to £14, have to be refunded, while the day following the closing of the financial year, the sum of £539 19s. 3d. had to be passed to pay current accounts; deducting therefore, these three amounts, the actual position of the Institution will be £658 4s. 1d. to the debit; nevertheless, considering the immense strain on our resources consequent on the increased number of poor relieved as compared with former years, there is every reason to be grateful.

It will be noted with satisfaction that the utmost economy in expenditure has been practised. By careful management, and a judicious system of revision of the dietary scale (without the slightest approach to deterioration or stinginess), a considerable saving has been effected in such items as groceries, meat, &c. That of "medical comforts" in the shape of wines, spirits and beer having entirely disappeared, while "maintenance" shows a considerable diminution on former years, most of the repairs, painting, &c., having been done by the inmates. These economies have been brought about chiefly by the strict attention to their duties of the Superintendent and Matron, to whom we accord our best thanks.

The Committee regret, that doubtless owing to the collapse, suspension and reconstruction of many financial institutions, the subscriptions from that quarter, and those connected with them, have fallen off considerably. It is to be hoped, however, that as the depression is now passing away, these bodies will see their way of soon resuming their former liberality.

Being unable to withstand the continued pressure of the numerous applicants for admission, the Committee increased the accommodation to the utmost capacity of the building (compatible with the sanitary laws prescribed by the Board of Health), by adding some 30 beds to the former number. This has not only involved a considerable outlay in furnishing and appointments,

but will further entail an additional cost of something like £300 per annum, which is likely to be perpetual, experience having shown that applicants increase in proportion to the accommodation provided; **THEY NEVER DIMINISH.** As this step has been taken with the view of accommodating the poor flocking in from outlying districts, the Committee have every confidence that the rural public bodies will act with greater liberality than they have done heretofore, to meet the additional demands on the resources of the Institution.

The Inspector of Public Charities visited the Asylum on the 2nd February, 1894, and sent in a satisfactory report as to the condition of the Asylum and inmates; also, that he found the books and accounts in good order. He recommended a few alterations, which have had the attention of your Committee.

### SPECIAL DONATIONS AND EFFORTS.

The Committee desire to acknowledge with thanks the following liberal donations:—Ballarat Charities Carnival, inaugurated by the A.N.A., per Messrs. W. Scott and J. B. Johns, £60 5s. 9d.; "Pinafore" performance, per Messrs. G. Herbert and R. L. Nicholl, £56 ls.; Mr. Martin Loughlin, J.P., £50; Executors of the late Mrs. C. E. Hepburn, £31 5s. 9d.; Sir Samuel Wilson, £20; Mr. and Mrs. Larter, £20; Mr. David Cooke, £15; and the Reformatory Visiting Committee, per Mr. Henry Brind, £15.

The Committee desire to thank the Ladies' Visiting Committee, and all those ladies, who by their kindness, have administered to the comfort of the inmates, and to the Ministers for attending to the spiritual wants of the old folk, and for the collections made at their various churches in aid of the funds of the Asylum.

The Committee gratefully appreciate the kindness of those who have supplied the old people with books, magazines, newspapers, &c., during the year.

Thanks are given to the representatives of the press, for the liberal way in which publicity is given to the proceedings of the Committee, and all matters connected with the Asylum.

The best thanks of the Committee are due to the hon. oculist, Dr. Guthrie, for his unremitting attention to those inmates requiring his services. Dr. Guthrie has performed some most delicate and successful operations, affording relief, and restoring the sight of many suffering from the painful infliction bordering almost on total blindness.

We beg to acknowledge the continued zeal, ability and assiduity displayed by the Secretary, Superintendent, Matron, Doctor, Nurse, and all employees under them, in the cheerful and efficient discharge of their respective duties.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

The Committee record with DEEP REGRET the death (by apoplexy) of Mrs. Phayer, late Matron of the Institution, the sad event having taken place suddenly on Sunday, 26th November last, whilst on a visit to her relatives. The deceased, who was for many years a faithful servant, had enjoyed the confidence of the Committee, who testified their respect by taking part in the obsequies, and by forwarding a letter of condolence to the bereaved relatives.

The vacant office of Matron has been filled by the appointment of Mrs. Atkinson (the wife of the Superintendent), a lady eminently qualified for the position. Mrs. Atkinson, who has introduced sundry salutary reforms in her department, thereby increasing the comfort of the inmates under her charge, is giving great satisfaction to the Committee. By this appointment, a considerable saving in salary has been effected.

Mr. D. Lessels, having resigned his seat on the Committee, Mr. J. W. Rail has been elected in his place.

It will be the business of the meeting to elect a President, 2 Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and 6 members of Committee, in place of those retiring by effluxion of time, viz., the Rev. Father Rogers, Messrs. W. Scott, O. E. Edwards, E. Murphy, W. Colman, and J. W. Rail, who are, however, eligible for re-election.

The grounds have never been in better order; useless and unsightly shrubs and hedges having been uprooted, affording room for the growth of more vegetables, so that a plentiful supply of this wholesome diet may at all seasons of the year be reasonably looked forward to.

Ashpaltting and drainage has been the order of the day (the work being done by inmates), giving the grounds a more cleanly and cheerful appearance.

The Committee cordially invite subscribers and well-wishers to visit the Institution as often as they can make it convenient, and judge for themselves of the efforts made in every direction for the comfort and happiness of the inmates, all of whom, but more especially those confined in the hospital and chronic wards, are ever grateful for the kindly sympathy and consolation afforded them by visitors.

Before closing this report, the Committee express the hope, that in view of the further reductions made in the Government Grant, and this in the face of heavy demands made and being made on your Institution through the prevailing depression (which they sincerely hope will soon pass away), and trust that the friends of the Asylum in the past will continue their liberal support, and that new subscribers will come forward to assist in the noble work of maintaining an Institution in every way worthy of the generous support of this and surrounding districts.

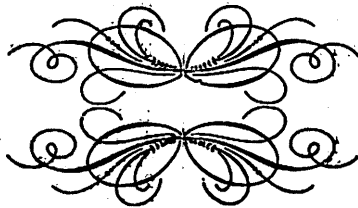

R U L E S  
OF THE

# Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum,

Adopted by the Governors, 24th January, 1867.

*OBJECTS:*

TO RELIEVE THE AGED, INFIRM, DISABLED, AND DESTITUTE,  
AND TO MINISTER TO THEIR NECESSITIES, ACCORDING TO  
THE ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE.

LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of £10 and upwards; every person not being a public collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of £20 or upward from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the Institution, shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the Institution shall be a Life Governor and entitled to vote.

ANNUAL GOVERNORS.

2. A donation of not less than £20 from a Shire Council, Road Board, or Municipal Council, shall entitle the Mayor, President, or Chairman of the Body donating, to be an Annual Governor. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards annually, shall be an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscription, and entitled to vote at all yearly and other special meetings of Governors; provided in the case of a new subscriber he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. The Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, three Honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen Governors. In the month of July in every year, one-third part of

the elected members of the Committee shall go out of office, except the Trustees (but may, nevertheless, be re-elected), and the persons who shall go out of office shall be those who have been the longest in office without re-election; or when two or more shall have been in office for the same length of time, then those who shall go out of office shall be determined by lot.

4. If any member of Committee shall die, or resign by letter under his hand addressed to the President of the Asylum, or become insolvent, or compound with his creditors, or become convicted of any treason, felony, or misdemeanour, or be absent from four consecutive ordinary meetings of the Committee, his office shall become vacant, and the remaining members of Committee may declare his office vacant, and temporarily appoint thereto a qualified contributor to the Asylum until the next Annual Meeting for the election of the Committee, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire, in addition to those herein before provided for, except in the case of a Trustee or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a General Meeting of the Governors.

5. The Annual Meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall be held in the month of July in each year, when a general report of the affairs of the Institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.

6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a Special Meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty-four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days' notice in one or more of the Ballarat daily papers of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such Special Meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

7. At the Annual or other Special Meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if after the expiration of half-an-hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have the power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time within seven days when such adjourned meeting shall be held.

8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulation, the same not being contrary to the general rules; appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the Institution; shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint; admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment;

and shall appoint Sub-Committees for all necessary purposes, and Auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting, but not a deliberative vote.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer shall be members *ex officio* of all Committees.

10. All Sub-Committees shall have at least five members, three to form a quorum.

11. The Accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of July in each year.

12. Any Member of Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself for two months without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No Member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have a pecuniary interest.

#### TREASURER.

14. All moneys received on account of the Institution shall be paid into the Bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

#### SECRETARY.

15. The Secretary shall attend all Annual, Special, and Committee Meetings; take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such Meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose; and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.

16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions and all moneys to or receivable by the Institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall within fourteen days of the time of receipt of moneys, pay over the same into the Bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting to the General or Executive Committee an account of the sums and names of the person from whom the same have been received.

17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the clerical business of his department; keep the accounts of the Institution, under the direction of the several Committees; compile all reports of the Committees; fill the cheques, and perform all the clerical duties connected with the Office of Secretary.

## HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified Medical Practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves; shall have access to the Institution at all times; perform all surgical operations and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.

19. Any Honorary Medical Officers neglecting his duty without reasonable cause shall cease to hold office.

Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the Rules, shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
