For the Year Ending 30th June, 1906.

To the Governors and Subscribers.

In accordance with the annual custom, your Committee have the honor to lay before you for your consideration the Report and Balance-Sheet for the year ending 30th June, 1906.

The income for the year is £6024 5s. 6d., and the expenditure £6619 11s. 1d., being an excess of £595 5s. 7d. above the income. This added to the balance from the previous year leaves a debit balance of £1144 6s. 1d. at the close of the year 1905-6.

I.—THE ASYLUM.

The daily average number of inmates for the year was 315·47, being 7·10 less than last year. The number of

inmates in the Asylum on the 30th June, 1906, was 236 males, 73 females—total 309—being a decrease of 23 males and 7 females, as compared with the previous year.

The average cost of maintenance per head was £16 6s. 6¾d. as against £14 5s. 0¼d. last year.

II.—LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

The number admitted during the year was 30 (6 adults and 2 children remaining from last year), total 36 adults and 2 children. 31 children were born, viz.:—17 males and 14 females. 33 adults and 31 children were discharged; 1 child died; leaving in the Hospital 3 adults and 1 child on the 30th June, 1906. The average period spent there was 37·72 days.

III.—OUTDOOR RELIEF.

The amount expended on out-door relief during the year was £1134 5s. 5d., showing a decrease of £63 10s. as compared with last year. The average number of recipients per week for the year ending 30th June, 1906, was 202·04 adults and 118·38 children; total, 320·42; and for the the previous year, 225·84 adults and 131 children; total, 356·84; being a decrease of 23·80 adults and 12·62 children; total decrease of adults and children, 36·42. The average cost per head per annum, for each adult and child was £3 10s. 9¼d., and per week, 1s. 4¼d., as against £3 7s. 1½d., and per week, 1s. 3½d. for the previous year. The total number of persons on the books, in-door and out-door, on 30th June, 1906, was 580.

IV.—THE FARM.

The produce sold and sent to the Asylum totals £31 49s.; stock on hand at the close of the year valued at £367 8s.; and the farm property valued at £260; grand total £941 17s. Total expenditure, including wages, horse and cattle feed, etc., purchase of cows, farm improvements, rent, rates, rations and refuse, £324 10s. 10d.; Stock on hand from the previous year, £305 7s. 6d.; the farm property valued at £260; making a grand total of £889 18s. 4d. The balance being a profit of £51 18s. 8d. for the year, as against a loss of £11 10s. 3d. for previous year.

V.—REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF CHARITIES.

The Inspector visited the Asylum as usual, and reported favourably of its general condition, the good order, cleanliness, and tidiness prevailing.

Solicitor, and two Auditors.

9.—GENERAL.

The Committee deeply regrets the loss of two valued members who have died—the late Mr. Jacob Showman, and Mr. Henry Josephs, J.P., both old members of the Committee, and who had rendered valuable service to the Committee, having held the office of President and Vice-President, also having been members of the Finance Committee for many years. The institution by their demise has lost two useful and warm-hearted members. The Committee also regrets to have to record the death of the late Superintendent, Mr. David Atkinson, who had proved himself to be a faithful and also invaluable officer during a period of fourteen years. His place was temporarily filled to our satisfaction for a few weeks by Mr. Theo. Saunders, when from a number of applicants Mr. C. C. Shoppee was appointed to the position, the duties of which he is carrying out very efficiently with the same energy and faithfulness he all along manifested when associated with us on our Board of Management.

The serious diminution of the Government Grant, as a result of the necessarily somewhat drastic economic policy of the State for the last few years—a policy which in its

general application appears to have made no discrimination in the great cause of Charity—has relatively increased the anxieties of the Management during that time to make ends meet. This policy as far as institutions like ours are concerned, might now, we consider, be well relaxed. The public finances have been restored to a condition of even exceptional prosperity, and the revenue for the year just passed has been the largest Victoria has yet been blessed with. In this connection our claims upon the Government for consideration are increased by the circumstance that a very large percentage of the inmates who left to avail themselves of the Old Age pension have been received back to the shelter and comforts of their "Old Home." Such a re-action obviously relieves the public Treasury, while it imposes increased obligations on the Asylum's resources.

We cannot lose sight of the fact that the close of the year finds us with an increased debit balance of £595 5s. 7d. We felt we dare not in the interests of our suffering poor refuse to render help wherever, after due enquiry, it was found to be a case of real genuine need, and so, irrespective of the fact that month by month we found ourselves going behind financially, the work which the Institution has so long existed for, has been fully and satisfactorily maintained to the benefit and help of our many inmates, and of numberless families in the City, Town, and extensive surrounding district. We have, therefore, again to urge upon the many who are strangers to the pinch of poverty, and have the wherewithal to give, be it much or little, to allow this Institution with its organised system of relief to be the almoners of their gifts, and whether called upon by our collector or not, to become regular contributors to our funds. To our many regular contributors we are thankful for their ready and cheerful support, and trust that their good example may be imitated, and the coming year find their ranks very considerably increased.

We have again to express our thanks to the Ministers and the many other workers in the various Churches for the good work done by them in promoting the spiritual welfare, and looking so well after the cheering and brightening the lives of our inmates; to those who have given their talents in connection with various concerts and entertainments in the institution; to many who have thoughtfully sent books magazines and papers as well as creature comforts; to our old valued Committeeman Mr. George Lovitt for his continued successful efforts in connection with the tobacco fund; to the press for so ably reporting our meetings and regularly bringing our work and its claims so favorably before the public; and to many others who year in and year out in many ways render us cheerful and ready service.

We are pleased to recognise and express our appreciation of the valuable services of all our officers and workers. The Hon. Medical Staff, Hon. Oculist, the Hon. Solicitor, Non-resident Medical Officer, the Superintendent, Matron, Maternity Ward and other Nurses, the Wardsmen, Gardener, and working staff generally, also the Secretary and Collector. We feel we are well served, and seeing that the Institution is so favorably spoken of by all who are brought into more or less close contact with it, is convincing proof of the faithful and efficient service rendered.

In common with my predecessors in the honorable position of President, it is my pleasing privilege individually, in closing the report for the year to acknowledge with warm appreciation the hearty co-operation of my colleagues on the Board of Management and the kindly courtesy they have extended to me. I have likewise to express my satisfaction at the capable manner in which the Officers of the Institution discharged their duties and I have to thank them for the assistance they gave me.
