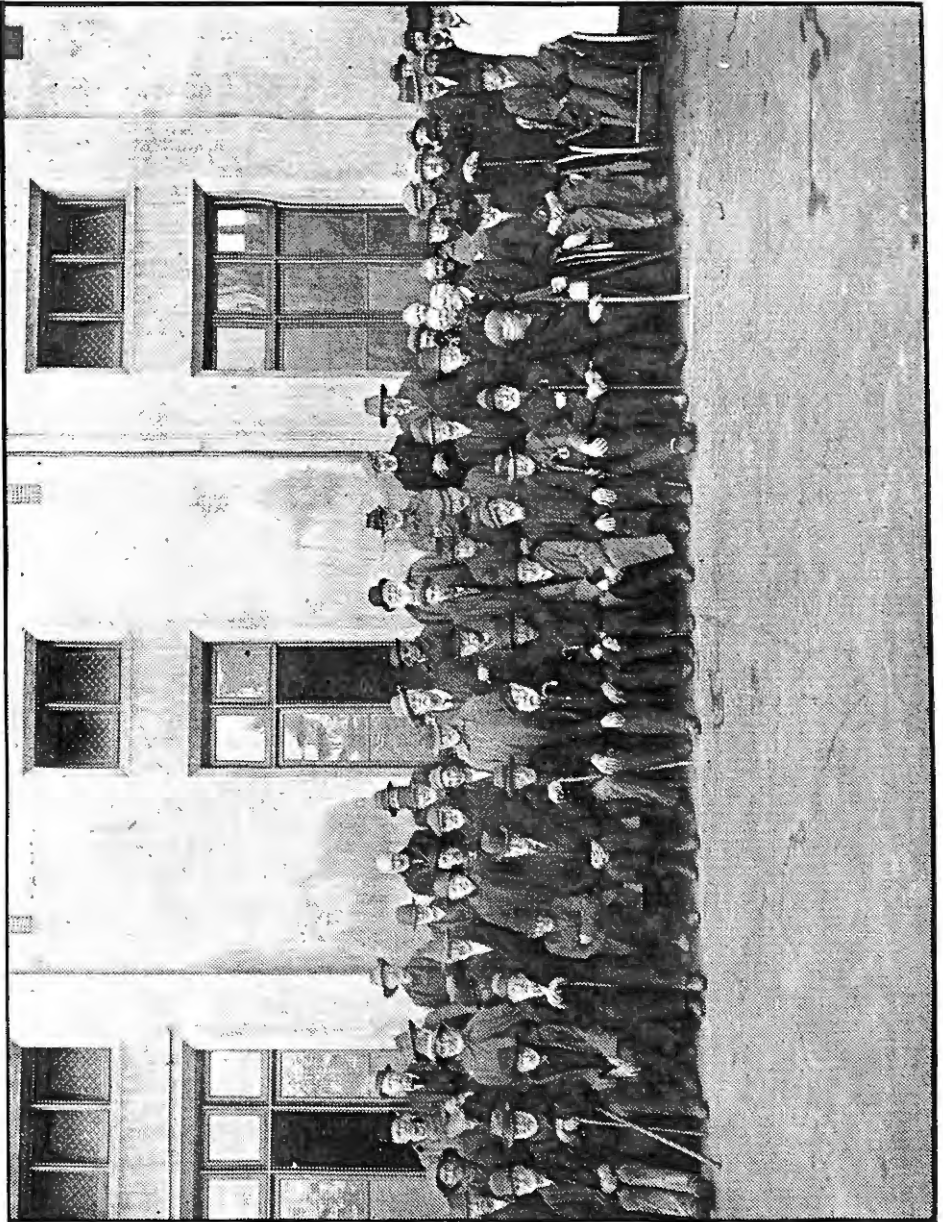

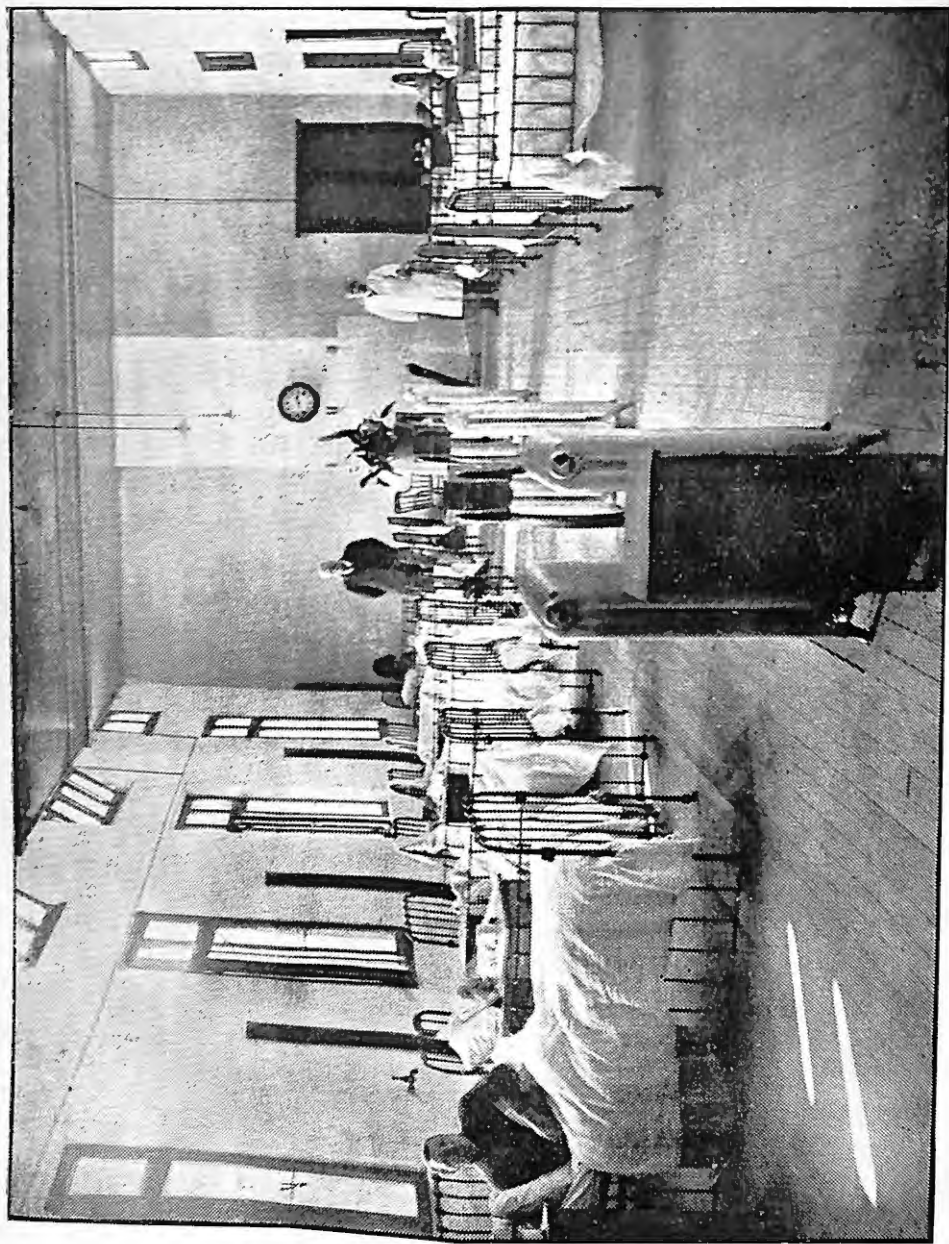

For the Year ending 30th June, 1923.

TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

In accordance with the annual custom your Committee has the honor to lay before you for your consideration the Report and Balance Sheet for the year ended 30th June, 1923.

FINANCIAL.

The income for the year was £7,339/17/10, and the expenditure £7911/11/6, being £571/13/8 more than the receipts. The overdraft now amounts to £1751/9/8, as compared with the overdraft of £1179/16/0 on June 30th, 1922.

1.—HOME.

The daily average number of inmates for the year was 191.60, being 23.01 more than last year. The number of inmates in the Home on June 30th, 1923, is 226, as against 180 last year.

The average annual cost per head for maintenance was £35 0/8½, as against £39/2/2 for the previous year, a reduction of £4/1/5½ per head.

2.—MATERNITY HOSPITAL.

The number admitted to the Maternity Hospital was 49; 46 children were born, including twin boys—30 males, 16 females.

3.—OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

Applicants for Out-door Relief and for Compassionate allowance have received that full consideration which has always been characteristic of these departments.

4.—SPECIAL DONATIONS AND EFFORTS.

5.—BEQUESTS.

Bequests amounting to £600/12/4 have been received.

6.—OFFICE-BEARERS.

It will be the business of the meeting to elect a President, and two Vice-Presidents, Hon. Treasurer, and seven members of Committee, who retire by effluxion of time, and offer themselves for re-election, together with the retiring President, Mr. J. Fraser. It will also be necessary to elect Honorary Solicitor, four Honorary Medical Officers, Honorary Dentist, Honorary Oculist, and two Auditors.

8.—GENERAL.

In reviewing the events of the past year, I find many important matters that call for more than passing reference.

Transfers from Geelong. For many years past the Geelong Hospital has been used in part as a Benevolent Asylum also. When it was resolved to demolish the old Geelong buildings and erect a new Hospital there, the State Treasurer was asked to find accommodation elsewhere for their Benevolent inmates. Sir William McPherson applied to us to take the cases, and in view of the crowded state of our women's dining room and sitting room, we were promised that a new building would be erected at a cost of £2,250. This will enable us to give the old ladies some reasonable comfort. These Geelong patients duly arrived, and your Superintendent and the Matron are doing their best to make the old folk comfortable. I personally met and welcomed the new arrivals, and am pleased to say that I was assured by them all that they were comfortable and happy in our care.

Buildings and Renovations. I understand that a tender for the erection of the addition to the women's dining hall and sitting room has been accepted, but so far no start in the erection of the building has been made. While on the subject of the building, I wish to report that a considerable amount of valuable work has been done in renovating the interior and exterior of the wards. Many of the large dormitories and most of the passages have been plastered and painted. The contrast between those that have been renovated and those that are yet to be done is most striking. Much of the exterior wood work which had perished from age and weather has also been renovated, with satisfactory results. The general supervision and expert advice freely and most willingly given by Mr. A. E. Nicholson and Mr. H. Wardle are worthy of some special expression of this Board's appreciation of their services.

Financial Help Needed The extraordinary expenditure involved in carrying out these necessary renovations and the need for money to enable us to undertake the many very urgent repairs to our old and time-worn buildings, emboldened me to suggest that an appeal for financial help should be made to the charitably disposed residents of Ballarat and District. To give this movement a suitable and appropriate beginning, it was felt that assistance should be sought from the State Treasurer. A schedule of works to cost £8,500 was submitted to Sir William McPherson, and he has had the proposals subjected to a most critical expert examination. I have reason to believe that the Public Works Architects expressed themselves as satisfied that the works proposed were necessary, and that the cost would probably exceed our estimate. We are now waiting for Sir William McPherson's decision as to how much money we shall receive by way of Grant from the Treasury. It is my intention, with this Board's approval, to ask His Worship the Mayor of the City to inaugurate the appeal by calling a public meeting. May I ask for the cordial support and practical help of every member of this Board in this great effort. In this connection, I desire to remind you that the Ballarat Benevolent Home has not been assisted financially by means of a Public Effort for very many years.

New Matron Owing to the lamented death of our Matron, Mrs. C. H. Burrow, it became necessary as one of the first of my official duties to arrange for her successor. We, and also our inmates, were fortunate in securing the services as Matron, of Nurse Gent. This lady had given her valuable services as head Nurse for over twenty-two years, during which time she had earned the affection of all those inmates who had been under her care, as well as the respect and confidence of the Members of this Board.

Resignation and Appointment Owing to his departure from Ballarat, our old esteemed past President and Member of the Board, Mr. T. P. Long, resigned. Mr. Long's services to this Institution during his many years of activities with us were very valuable. Mr. W. A. Stark was appointed to the Board in his place.

Death of Dr. McGowan It is with the deepest regret that I have to record the death of our Medical Officer, Doctor A. G. McGowan. Although comparatively a young man, Dr. McGowan had held his important office at this Institution for just twenty years. His work among the inmates, whether in the Hospital or in the Maternity wards, was characterised by a genial good will combined with remarkable success in gaining and holding the confidence of the large number of patients entrusted to his care. The good, healthy condition of the inmates; their freedom from out-breaks of disorders (such as will attack patients in open wards and with the general liberty to come and go and be visited daily by strangers), is the best proof of the late Doctor McGowan's care. Added to this must be recorded a condition of close personal friendship amounting almost to veneration, felt by the inmates and the staff to the Doctor. In the Maternity Hospital, frequent evidence of his exceptional skill was given. Doctor McGowan gave the best that he had in knowledge and skill, as well as in sympathy to those of God's poor who depend on our Home for that ease and comfort which their days of trouble demand of us.

An acknowledgement for valuable services rendered by our Honorary Staff is tendered. I regret to announce that Doctor Richards has decided to terminate his association with our Honorary Medical Staff, owing to unsatisfactory health. We trust that he may be blessed with a renewal of vigor and capacity to continue the good work he has been doing for many years in this City.

Entertainment At Home Many pleasant evenings and treats have been provided by a very large circle of talented and generous friends. On behalf of the inmates I wish to thank all who helped, and to say that it is only the fear of overlooking some names that prevents me from attempting to enumerate the host of willing workers.

Spiritual Care Our Spiritual assistants, lay, as well as clerical, have continued the good work so ably carried out in the past. Theirs is a labor of love and I know, needs no thanks. yet I must ask them to accept our grateful appreciation of their efforts.

The Press. To the Ballarat Press I can only repeat what has been said regularly every year by my predecessors. No consideration of space ever prevents our friends in control of the Press from assisting us to carry out our task of helping those who are unable to help themselves.

The Staff Mr. C. H. Burrow, our Superintendent and Secretary, the Matron (Sister Gent), and the whole of the Staff shoulder their duties, and sometimes very heavy responsibilities, in an admirable spirit of helpfulness and goodwill. I desire to thank them on behalf of Mrs. Fraser and myself for their ever-willing assistance rendered to us.

In conclusion, I feel that I owe an apology to the members of the Board of Management for this somewhat lengthy report. I must plead the peculiar circumstances of this eventful year as my excuse. I am deeply grateful for the invariable courtesy and consideration of the members of the Board, and tender to one and all my best thanks.

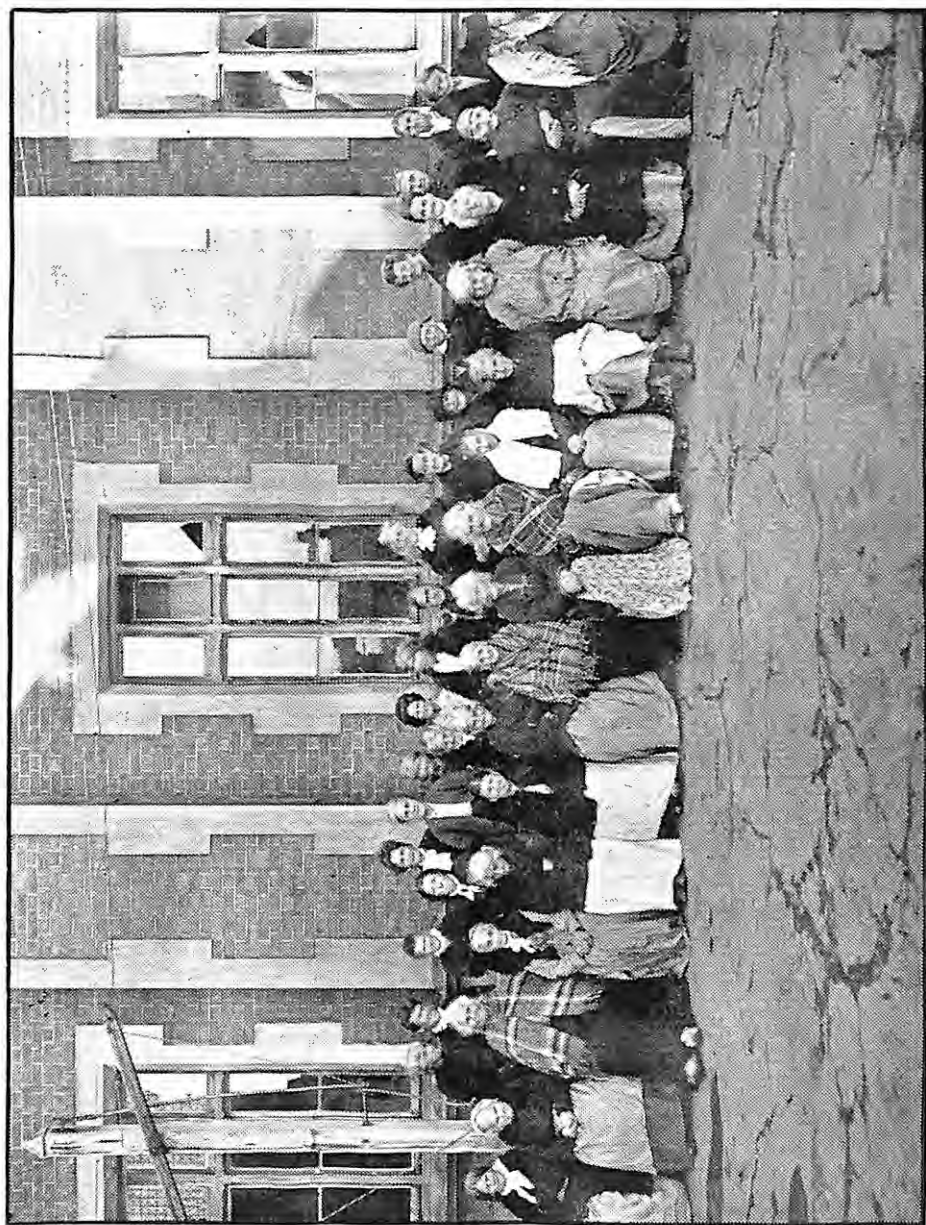

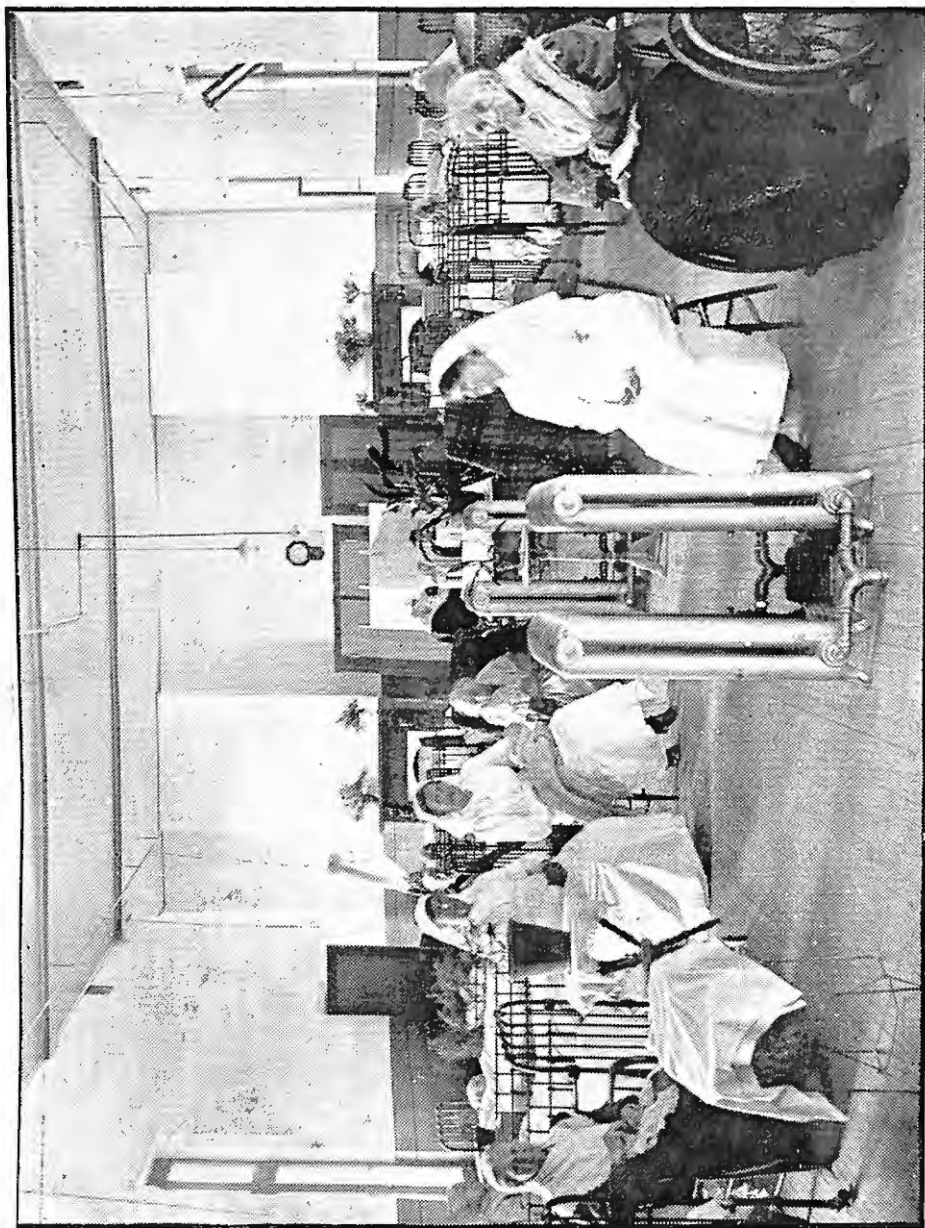
